
Some of the Liberal Democrat Priorities for Britain



Rt Hon Vince Cable MP, Leader of Liberal Democrats NHS

- Saving the NHS by putting a penny in the pound on Income Tax to give the NHS and social care services the cash injection they need
- Transforming mental health care with waiting time standards to match those in physical health care

Commuter Parking on a Key Berkhamsted Route



Liberal Democrat members have supported the long-running campaign by local residents to end commuter parking on Bridgewater Road. It is a well-used road. Cars left there all day are both a nuisance and a hazard, dangerously obscuring sight-lines from driveways, requiring bus passengers to stand out in the road and sometimes blocking the road completely. On one occasion, an ambulance taking an elderly person to hospital in an emergency was held up for 15 minutes.

Herts County Council has finally recognised the problem and is now proposing to ban parking between 11.00 am and 12.00 noon, Monday to Friday along the part of Bridgewater Road not already covered by restrictions. The County Council consulted local residents recently in a "public engagement exercise". There will be a full public consultation in September/October.





Herts Fire & Rescue Service is Still at Risk of Takeover by Police & Crime Commissioner

The Liberal Democrats right across the County are leading the opposition against attempts by the local Police & Crime Commissioner to take over Hertfordshire's Fire & Rescue Service.



On 11th July Dacorum Councillors unanimously voted for a Lib Dem Motion instructing the Chief Executive to write to the Home Office to insist that "the Fire & Rescue Service should remain under the control and democratic accountability of Hertfordshire County Council." Lib Dem County Councillor for Hemel Hempstead St. Paul's, Ron Tindall, proposed the Motion arguing that: "the service is highly effective and the evidence does not support the need for such a move" and stating

that, "The Commissioner's revised bid to the Home Office showed a lack of understanding of the service, and his calculations are not based in reality."

All 78 Herts County Councillors agreed to oppose the Police & Crime Commissioner's bid to take over the Fire & Rescue Service when he made it last summer. They repeated their opposition on 18th June.

Cllr Tindall concluded, "Our Fire & Rescue Service should not be a political prize. It should be overseen by the 78 County Councillors, who are far more able to listen to the people and whose scrutiny is far more robust."

Similar motions are proposed or have been passed already by Watford, Three Rivers, St Albans,

Berkhamsted Multi Storey Car Park

Dacorum Borough Council has now contracted for this expensive monstrosity in Lower Kings Road with space for 327 cars. Work will start this September with a planned completion date of June/July 2019. While the work goes on we will lose a net 36 parking spaces in the centre of Berkhamsted. The disruption will be considerable and will carry on right through the important Christmas trading period.

The Borough has decided The Moor, which is owned by the Borough will be the "best" location for alternative parking during construction. A

temporary surface will be laid over the grass and will provide 85 parking spaces at a cost of £100,000. It could take the Moor over two years to recover afterwards. A planning application for this change of use is expected to be rushed through in September.

Residents of Castle Street and Mill Street can look forward to a prolonged period of traffic chaos, since access to and from The Moor will pose challenges, especially for visitors to the Town who may be unfamiliar with the roads and narrow junctions. Moreover those roads are crossed several times a day by students moving between school buildings - an obvious increase in risk.

Berkhamsted has an acute traffic problem already. Air quality is deteriorating and the Borough has not answered warnings of worsening traffic congestion and air pollution.

People with long memories will recall the angry debates on the Controlled Parking Schemes, which also divided the Town Council Tories, leading later to a resignation.

It is now far too late to stop this project. First announced by Dacorum's Tory Council Leader 6 years ago during a budget debate without consultation, information or explanation. Just like the recent deplorable Leisure Service decision, he and the other Tory Borough councillors have turned a deaf ear to objections and constructive suggestions.

Even at the original estimate of £3 million the project failed to meet DBC's usual investment criteria. It's worse now as the cost has soared to over £5.1 million. Each of the 206 additional parking spaces will cost around £25,000. Proposed parking charges have not yet been made public - but keep a lookout for any announcement. With capital costs like these, it's obvious that those charges could be very high indeed.

After 10 years of austerity following the banking crash, money is tight in the public sector. Yet, like the minority Tory government which squandered a billion pounds buying support from the DUP, in Dacorum the Tories are squandering taxpayers' money on a contentious scheme that they're foisting on Berkhamsted. The Tories are reckless spendthrifts - with other people's money.

Why support them any longer? When the Tories come calling, just say "No, thanks!"

"Mind the Gap` and Keep the Playground Clean," says Liberal Democrat Town Councillor Freda Earl

Like the rest of us, Cllr Earl is worried about the use of the Moor as a temporary car park - but she's also been trying to get two problems fixed by Dacorum Borough Council, which owns it. One problem is the damage to the railings beside the road bridge over the stream. As she points out, "The ground below the railings is loose and on a steep slope. A toddler could slip down and under the gap at the bottom. And where a bar is missing from the railings an older child could slip through and fall into the

water below." (pictures on left)



The other problem is that the playground is not demarcated from the rest of the Moor in any way - so there is nothing to keep dogs out.

This exposes young children to the possibility of getting a worm infection from dog dirt.
